## History

**History:** 

Towards the end of 1944, the Old Eastbornians Association elected a committee to consider a suitable memorial to Old Eastbournians lost in the war. It was decided that the school needed playing fields. The grounds and remaining buildings of St. Cyprians Preparatory School, situated almost opposite the Golf Clubhouse in Paradise Drive were for sale at £12,500 and were secured by a deposit. An endowment fund had been started at the beginning of the war and a War Memorial Fund, and others. A lych gate was erected with a path leading to the Memorial Field. The lych gate was designed by Sir Hugh Casson, an Old Eastbournian. The whole was opened by Air Chief Marshal Sir john Baker (Old Eastbournian) on Sunday 27 July 1956.
